## 45 THINGS TO TRY IN YOUR Art Journal



- 1. Small chipboard or wooden letters make great 3-D additions to a journal page. Use them to say what you're thinking or let them simply function as embellishments. Either way, they'll be an eye-popping detail.

- 23. Instead of using glue, trap a piece of ephemera behind tulle or cheesecloth. The material will add amazing texture and help obscure finer details if you're feeling secretive.
